### a. Transit Activities

- NECTD still operating with a maximum capacity of five passengers at one given time due to COVID-19 social distancing requirements.
- Ridership counts are still below pre-pandemic averages.
- Social distancing and mask requirements still implemented.
- Plainfield pilot ridership holding steady.

### b. Animal Services Program

- Due to animal hoarding, NECCOG Animal Services has been conducting more animal seizures.
- Adoption activity has not been effected by COVID-19.

## c. Paramedic Intercept Program

- 2021 Stats:
  - Calls for Service 3,725
  - ALS Transports 2,471
  - Cardiac Arrest with Resuscitation Attempt 28
- Towns pay NECCOG \$69.00 per transport for such services for transports to Day Kimball Hospital, and \$105.00 for transports to all other locations.

### d. Crumbling Foundations

- 1,913 registered claimants in the CFSIC system
- 773 claims covered by Participation Agreements (eligible for funding)

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- CFSIC has put 459 families back in homes with new foundations, inclusive of 47 condominium units.
- CFSCI has made \$84,188,161 in claim payments to date.
- The cap on allowable construction costs will rise to \$190,000 from \$175,000 for standalone homes, and to \$76,000 for \$70,000 for condo units - effective 9:00am January 5, 2022.
