
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Deviated—Fixed Route Ridership

Serving Brooklyn, Killingly, Plainfield, Putnam and Thompson








Elderly-Disabled Ridership









Animal Services Program









Regional Paramedic Intercept Program



Budget & Bond Package Key Increases in Municipal Aid!

Education Equalization Grants (ECS): Increases funding by \$150 million in FY and FY 25 and provides funding to hold towns harmless from reductions due to the phased in implementation of changes to the ECS formula.

Local Bridge Funding – Doubles funding from \$10 million per year to \$20 million per year – Increasing funding for the Local Bridge program is one of COST's top priorities this session.

Local Capital Improvement Program (LoCIP): Doubles funding from \$30 million per year to \$60 million per year – COST called for increases in LoCIP funding because funding has not been increased since 1988.

Small Town Economic Assistance Program (STEAP) – Under the Governor's proposed budget, STEAP would have received \$0 funding in FY 24 and \$30 million in FY 25. The Bond package increases funding to \$35 million per year

Town Aid Road: Level funds TAR at \$60 million per year (will be funded from General Fund rather than bond funding)

Transportation Rural Improvement Program – Doubles funding from \$5 million per year to \$10 million per year

Mashantucket Pequot and Mohegan Grants: Maintains funding at \$51,481,796 - The budget does not fold the program into other municipal grants as proposed by the Governor.

Municipal Revenue Sharing Fund: Redirects sales tax revenue from the Municipal Revenue Sharing Account to provide \$547,098,417 to the Municipal Revenue Sharing Fund (MRSF) in both FY 24 and FY 25 which includes the following grants: (1) \$317,088,143 for Tiered PILOT, (2) \$155,337,805 for Municipal Transition grants (Motor Vehicle Tax Cap Grants), and (3) \$74,672,470 for Supplemental Revenue Sharing Grants (Municipal Stabilization Grant and GF Municipal Revenue Sharing grant combined).

Medicaid Reimbursement Rate - Ambulance Providers - COST was successful in working with the CT Association of Ambulance Providers to win an increase in the Medicaid Reimbursement Rate and mileage rate for Ambulance Services. The Appropriations Committee budget increases funding by \$2.5 million in FY 24 and FY 25 which will leverage additional federal funding to better fund ambulance services, including mileage rates.

Early Voting - The budget includes \$3.5 million in FY 25 to assist municipalities in implementing early voting.
